#### CERA 398/2 A SPECIAL TOPICS IN CERAMICS: ALCHEMICAL PRACTICES IN FILM ANIMATION (4 credits) Tuesday, 8:30-12:30.

### **Job Specific Requirements**

Applicants must have an MFA (or equivalent) in addition to appropriate technical, digital and/or critical, theoretical expertise for the courses to which they are applying. Applicants should have distinguished themselves in their field by having a significant and active professional record (i.e. teaching, exhibitions, performances, screenings and/or publications). Previous teaching experience is desirable and a working knowledge of French is considered an asset.

Part-time faculty members who have successfully taught a course three (3) times or more are deemed to be professionally and academically qualified to teach the same course or a closely related course. Applicants who have not met these requirements must submit the following:

i. An up-to-date curriculum vitae

ii. A statement that addresses how their professional practice qualifies them to teach this course

iii. A statement that addresses the teaching approach/strategy for this course

iv. Digital documentation of the applicant's artistic practice

# 'Additional Comments'/<u>Class Detail (Class Schedule - Undergraduate)</u>: Special Topic: Alchemical Animation

This interdisciplinary collaboration with Film Animation is a studio course experimenting with the arts of film animation and ceramic materials and practices. Short group projects and exercises will lead to sculptural objects, installations and animation films. Informed by contemporary art practices enhanced by field trips and guest lectures, this course introduces students to the unique combination of independent auteur animation filmmaking, direct-animation techniques and ceramic fabrication.

CERA 398 Special Topics in Ceramics (3 credits)

A workshop/seminar, providing an opportunity for the study of specialized aspects of ceramics. Specific topics for this course, and prerequisites relevant in each case, are stated in the Undergraduate Class Schedule.

# CERA 398/2, Stu A - Expertise Required

- A demonstrated knowledge of time-based production as applied in a ceramics context and experience working and teaching technically demanding studio courses involving ceramics and film animation.

- Emphasis on a creative and critically-informed artistic approach to ceramics and film animation with a knowledge of ceramic history and contemporary practice.

- Experience with all hand-building techniques and a working knowledge of ceramic processes including low and high firing, glaze chemistry and surface development.

The ability to independently (i.e. without a technician) demo, problem-solve, guide and assist students in their own projects from basic through advanced ceramics processes.
Ability to teach students to produce a coherent and professional body of work in ceramic sculpture.

- Extensive health and safety knowledge associated with ceramics equipment, materials and safe studio practices
