How to Get Students to Read & Understand More: Some practical strategies

Research shows that a majority of post-secondary students do not read what's assigned, or only read superficially. Given the correlation between reading and course success, it is critical that students complete their reading assignments and read at a deeper level. This workshop will help you unpack the reasons behind your students' noncompliance with course readings and identify strategies to encourage your students to prepare appropriately for each class. These strategies are part of a holistic approach that examines multiple elements of a course, including course alignment, selection of readings, assignment design, in-class activity design, reading strategies instruction, and motivational factors. You will walk away with a set of widely applicable strategies to employ in your class.

They mostly struggle with universities' demands of higher-order thinking skills such as analyzing, reasoning, and evaluation.

This workshop aims at providing instructors with a road map and strategies that are easy to implement in their courses to help students learn more deeply and meaningfully, achieve more success in their studies, and become self-regulated learners.

By the end of this workshop, participants will be able to:

- Define the two main metacognition processes.
- Explore effective teaching strategies to help students evaluate and adapt their learning skills to become increasingly more effective at learning.
